I'm a quality vice quantity type of teacher when it comes to writing, so there is no set length requirement. I'm looking for you to tell me what you think and why. As long as you fully explain your responses, length is not an issue. I am not a fan of including a lot of unnecessary fluff in writing.

Free Response Question (FRQ) Prompt:

The Westboro Baptist Church (WBC) of Topeka, Kansas has been in the news quite often in the last few years. They have made a name for themselves by picketing places and events that have caused outrage by many. While their picketing activities have been peaceful, their words and signs have been anything but. For example, members of the church picket the funerals of dead soldiers carrying signs that say things like "Thank God for Dead Soldiers", "Thank God for IEDs" (improvised explosive devices), and "Thank God for 9/11". Their vitriolic hate speech has targeted many minority groups in this country.

In 2013, the WBC picketed four local high school graduations (Lakeland, Haines City, Harrison School for the Arts, and Lake Region) that were held at the Lakeland Center and on Florida Southern College campus, claiming perverts ran the schools. They picketed several Lakeland church services as well (First Baptist, First United Methodist, and St. Joseph Catholic). While these demonstrations were peaceful, they were certainly unpleasant for graduating seniors, their family members, and members of the picketed congregations.

A quick internet search will provide you a wealth of information about the organization if you are unfamiliar with it.

Given the above, address these three related questions:

- 1. While the actions of the Westboro Baptist Church members may be distasteful, should the First Amendment to the U.S. Constitution continue to protect their right to conduct these demonstrations, or should Congress step in and pass laws that would limit their rights to picket funerals, churches, and other seemingly inappropriate places and activities?
- 2. Should speech be legally curtailed if the majority of people find that speech to be morally reprehensible? Explain.
- 3. Should there be limits on free speech in general? Why or why not?
